

## (Name) CLP notes that:

- The UK will leave the European Union on March 29th 2019 if a majority of MPs vote for the EU Withdrawal And Implementation (WAI) Bill
- 2. The Labour Party campaigned for Remain in the 2016 referendum and has a long history of supporting full membership of the EU
- 3. The majority of voters aged 18-35 year old voted to Remain in the EU

## (Name) CLP believes that:

- 1. If the UK leaves the European Union, our country will be poorer, have diminished influence in the world and the greatest burden will fall on the poorest and youngest in society
- 2. Since the referendum result, several promises by the Leave campaign, including the claim that an additional £350m would become available for the NHS upon leaving the EU, have been shown to be wildly optimistic or false
- 3. In a democracy, people should have the right, and the opportunity, to change their minds when new information becomes available
- 4. There is clear evidence that a majority of both Labour Party supporters and younger voters are opposed to Brexit
- 5. That the strong 2017 General Election result achieved under the leadership of Jeremy Corbyn means the votes of Labour MPs will have a decisive impact on the trajectory of Brexit
- 6. It is now clear that no form of Brexit can meet Labour's six tests

## (Name) CLP resolves:

- 1. The Labour Party should give the British people the opportunity to have the final say, by:
  - Voting against the Withdrawal Agreement and Implementation (WAI) Bill

AND

- 2. Supporting a referendum on the final terms of the exit deal, with an option to remain full members of the European Union
- 2. Our delegates to Party Conference in 2018 will vote in favour of any motion that aligns with this resolution
